SDHC recently released a report that showed that the majority of the San Diegans who received help at last month's The 8th Project Homeless Connect – Downtown San Diego

Homeless Assessment Report to Congress - Volume II, which is based on data collected in Point-in-Time Counts across the country. But according to the PHC report, homeless participants who received services were older. The report is based on information PHC participants provided about themselves at this one-day resource fair.
