With the help from our federal partner — the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) — we have been able to reach out into the community to keep children safe, as well as prepare for the upcoming winter season to protect some of our most vulnerable citizens.

Blood-Lead Testing: Protecting Children

One hundred and twenty-five children were tested for hazardous lead in their blood at a community festival Saturday in a screening event sponsored by SDHC's "Home Safe Home" <u>program</u>. Of those, six tested positive for lead.

It was the largest of five blood-lead screening events conducted since October 27, 2010, as part of "Home Safe Home," which receives its funding from HUD grants. To date, 384 children have been tested.

The testing, conducted in partnership with the Environmental Health Coalition and La Maestra Community Health Clinic, uses blood samples from a pin prick to a finger and portable analyzers purchased by SDHC. It takes about three minutes to get results.

Parents of children who test positive are referred to local clinics for further evaluation;

they also are offered home inspections to help identify and eliminate the source of any lead poisoning.

Sponsor-Based Vouchers: Assisting Homeless San Diegans

By the end of the year, 150 homeless downtown San Diegans may find a place to call home as SDHC prepares to distribute rental assistance vouchers to non-profit organizations that provide services and housing. The program is SDHC's largest-ever release of Sponsor-based housing vouchers and is funded by HUD.

SDHC currently is receiving proposals from nonprofit organizations applying for the vouchers. They must also provide supportive services, and the Request for Proposals (RFP) weighted rating system contains incentives for organizations



non-profits serving homeless San Diegans.

assisting the chronically homeless. Project 25, a similar effort by SDHC in partnership with the United Way of San Diego County, helped stabilize lives and reduced costs of public resources by millions.
