have permanent rental apartments they can afford.

Vista del Puente consists of 26 apartments for Veterans who experienced homelessness, 12 apartments for non-Veterans who experienced homelessness; and 13 apartments for

families who were not homeless, but have low income.

Through HOUSING FIRST SAN DIEGO, SDHC s homelessness action plan, SDHC awarded 38 federal rental housing vouchers to provide rental assistance and a development loan of

\$4.1 million. This loan included \$3.6 million in HUD HOME Investment Partnerships Program funds awarded to the City of San Diego and administered by SDHC.
